On Thursday, July 7, about 5,000 people wore one in honor of what would be the 110th birthday of the Mexican painter Frida Kahlo, at the Dallas Museum of Art (DMA) in Texas. Their goal was to set the first Guinness World Record for the largest gathering of people in Frida garb, i.e., sporting at least three flowers on top of the head, a pink or red ribozo (shawl), a knee-covering dress—ness sleighs please—and, of course, the iconic single jug of Kahlo. The goal was to hit 250 people. The DMA estimates about 1,100 Fridas meets the criteria for attempting records, which will not be official until the Guinness World Records certification. The event, called "Frida Fest", was the brainchild of two Mexican immigrants affiliated to the Latin Center for Leadership Development, which hosted the event with the DMA. The mission of the non-profit is to help the city and the state government better reflect the fact that more than 40% of the population of Dallas is Hispanic. The group was also instrumental in bringing to DMA an exhibition of Mexican art that will take place until July 16. The exhibition includes The Two Fridas, one of Kahlo's most arresting paintings, a double portrait with interconnected and exposed hearts. In an effort to get that and other masterpieces in front of the city's Hispanic community, organizers spread the word to taquerías and barber shops, and also obtained sponsor to cover the admission price of \$16 on certain dates. The swarm of Fridas that packed the spacious main hall of the DMA, poured to its gardens, and snakes around the block, also spoke to something wider than Mexican culture and identity. "She represents the individuality of a person who exercises the right to be authentic," said Agustín Arteaga, director of the DMA. Frida devotees who presented races, nationality, age, class, gender and sexual orientation - an important result in a city thatlargely segregated by income and breed.
